Congratulations, Chandra Sankurathri!

It is indeed an honour and a recognition of his volunteer effort that Chandra Sankurathri was awarded a scholarship to attend the 1998 International Association for Volunteer Effort (IAVE98) 15th. Biennial World Volunteer Conference held from 23 - 27 August in Edmonton, Alberta. About 2700 delegates from 86 countries attended the conference organized by the Wild Rose Foundation of Alberta and the Canadian International Development Agency.

Sarada Vidyalayam, Kakinada, AP, India.

The school was reopened in July for about 75 children in 6 grades.

Eye Camp sponsored by the Telugu Literary Society of Manitoba, Winnipeg.

The camp was conducted by Srikiran Institute of Ophthalmology in Gollapadu village, in Khammam district, about 400 km from Kakinada, on 28 June 1998. This is a backward area inhabited by 'Lambada' tribals, who usually have higher incidence of cataract blindness.

A total of 311 (Female 166 + Male 145) were screened and 98 were identified as having operable cataracts. After counseling, only 43 came forward for the surgery. They were taken to Kakinada and 64 surgeries (both eyes for some) with IOL implants were performed. After recovery, the patients were provided with post operative medications and clear instructions regarding post operative care and transported them back to their villages.



We thank the Telugu Literary Society of Manitoba for the \$1000 donation. The rest of the expenses, about \$2500, were subsidized by the Institute and in-kind services and publicity were provided by the local Co-Operative Bank.

At a function on July 25, Chandra received an award and on that occasion, he and Dr. Vinod Mootha, ophthalmologist from Dallas, Texas, spoke about the educational and eye care services provided free of charge to the rural poor in the coastal area near Kakinada in Andhra Pradesh, India.

The function was held on 21 August in Cumberland City Hall in Orleans, a suburb of Ottawa. His Excellency, Mr. Rajanikanta Verma, High Commissioner for India, was the Chief Guest. Dr. Indu Gambhir from the Canadian Medical Protective Association was the Master of Ceremonies.

After a short video presentation, Dr. Chandra Sankurathri, President of MSMF, Founder of Sarada Vidyalayam (School for Children) and Srikiran Institute of Ophthalmology, illustrated with slides the backwardness of the coastal area around Kakinada and the real need for educational services for poor children and quality eye care services, most importantly, cataract blindness control program for the region.

Next, Dr. V. K. Raju, President of Eye Foundation Of America, Co-Founder of Srikiran Institute of Ophthalmology and its Chief Medical Consultant, explained from his well over 20 years of experience, some of the problems found in children are due to marriages among first cousins, a common practice in that area. He showed in many cases how a simple surgery timely done rectifies the problem and restores the quality of life.

Dr. Vinod Mootha, Ophthalmologist on Fellowship at Southwestern Medical Centre, Dallas, Texas, said that he felt good to volunteer for almost a year at Srikiran, as Kakinada is his place of birth, which he left with his parents to the US, when he was a child. He spoke highly of the quality of eye care available at Srikiran, beginning from screening camps held in villages to cataract surgeries done in the hospital and the follow-up visits by the patients. He observed that the team of ophthalmologists and nurses working at Srikiran are well qualified professionals.

Mr. Pierre Barbeau, Executive Director of Help the Aged (Canada), spoke about the Andhra Pradesh / Uttar Pradesh Primary Health Care and Training Program. Under this program, Help the Aged is supporting Srikiran with its capacity building and cataract blindness control programs. Mr. Barbeau mentioned that the program is supported by Help the Aged funds matched by grants from the Canadian International Development Agency. He remembered his 1997 visit to Srikiran to monitor the Project and said that he is pleased with the progress.

The 1998 MSMF Humanitarian Awards were presented by His Excellency, Mr. Rajanikanta Verma, High Commissioner for India, to St. Gregory Catholic School and Dr. Vinod Mootha.

For the sixth consecutive year, the students and staff of St. Gregory Catholic School raised funds during Lent to share with the students of Sarada Vidyalayam. Over the years, these donations were

spent to equip the class rooms, and buy uniforms for the students. Students of St. Gregory and Sarada regularly exchanged greetings and gifts and wrote to each other. This contact established a continuing friendship between the two schools. For St. Gregory School, Mr. John Makadi, President of School Council, accepted the award.

Dr. Vinod Mootha obtained his M.D. from John's Hopkins University School of Medicine, Baltimore, Maryland, and did his residency in Ophthalmology at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin. He took a one year break before continuing with his fellowship at Southwestern Medical Centre, Dallas, Texas, to volunteer his services at Srikiran. Dr. Mootha's services at Srikiran are exceptional and his contribution a lasting one. Dr. Mootha accepted the award.

Ms. Mythri Kappagantula, a student of Rati School of Dance, Ottawa, Ontario, gave a wonderful Bharata Natyam (Indian Classical Dance) recital. Mythri is a Grade 12 student at Ashbury College. Her other interests are Western and Karnatik music and competetive rowing.
