Greetings!

One reporter from the South Asian Focus observed, “some times it takes a tragedy to set in motion a more noble cause – and so it has proved in this case”. He was writing about Dr. Chandra Sankurathri after meeting him at the Open House, in Mississauga, Ontario. What impressed him are Dr. Chandra’s accomplishments, which “bring light to troubled eyes, and provide free primary education to children from poor families”. The Open House was well attended and very well organized by Ms. Meera and Mr. Vikram Sundar, Ms. Lakshmi and Mr. Raman Rudrabhatla, Mr. Siva Nadendla, and Mr. Ravi Gopisetty.

On this visit, Dr. Chandra traveled across Canada, from Quebec to British Columbia, and in the USA, from Texas to New York, raising awareness and gathering volunteer and financial support for MSMF.

In Montreal, Mrs. Rubina and Dr. Soeb Rangwala, after seeing the award winning CBC Documentary, A Ray Of Light, and also inspired by the quotation, “you make a living by what you GET, however, you make a life by what you GIVE”, arranged a cultural event in Montreal to raise awareness and funds, which was a thorough success. After the event Mrs. Rangwala said, “We all had a very enjoyable time and went home feeling enriched for having had the opportunity of being a part of this virtuous cause. We hope to make this an annual event”.

At the 2007 Teacher-Librarians of Durham District School Board (DDSB) Annual Dinner, to honour those who are retiring, President Ms. Nancy Dalrymple invited Dr. Chandra to be the Guest Speaker. Award winning author and friend of DDSB, Mr. Eric Walters, introduced Dr. Chandra to the Teacher-Librarians. Ms. Dalrymple remarked, “Mr. Walters is aware of the many Global Justice issues that the Teacher-Librarians have taken over the years”. Dr. Chandra gave a PowerPoint presentation on “Right to Education”. Ms. Dalrymple said, “This Foundation could be another added to the list that students in Durham raise funds for”.

Heading to western Canada, Dr. Chandra visited his alma-mater, University of Alberta, where he gave a presentation at the Faculty Club on “The Role of MSMF in Empowering Rural People in India”.

On his way, he stopped in Calgary and Golden, where he had renewed contacts with Dr. Dinesh Mistry, and friends.

In British Columbia, MSMF has a very strong support group. In Vancouver, Dr. Chandra met Mr. Noordin Madatali, who is very much interested in developing the Vocational School. A physician from Surrey, Dr. Rajeev Saincher, has offered to develop the Volunteer Program for MSMF. On June 23, Volunteers Ms. Shae Arjun, and Mr. Michael Palano arranged a visit to the Memorial in Stanley Park to the Victims of the Air India Tragedy, and a lunch for all volunteers giving them an opportunity to meet Dr. Chandra. Ms. Trish Sare of BikeHike Adventures Inc., “inspired by all that Dr. Chandra has accomplished and is proposing for those who have very little hope or support”, pledged to donate \$25 to MSMF in 2007 for every person who signs up to one of their multi-sport adventure trips she conducts at 22 destinations around the world. Ms. Sare would like to develop BikeHike Adventures in India that incorporate MSMF, whether it is to raise awareness or promote volunteers among her clients.

Good friends Mrs. Ann and Dr. Hu King arranged two events in Salt Spring Island; a wonderful opportunity to address the congregation at the All Saints Church, and another session in the evening, where Dr. Chandra gave a PowerPoint presentation on the topic “ Role of MSMF in Empowering Rural People in India”. The Salt Spring Island residents are very generous supporters of the Blindness Prevention program of MSMF.

In Ottawa, he visited St. Gregory and St. Isidore Schools, met Principals Burke, and Kryski, addressed the students, who every year raise donations to support our school in Kakinada. He also visited the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), and Help the Aged Canada, He met the Deputy Minister of Health Canada, and the High Commissioner of India. He attended a meeting at the University of Ottawa Eye Institute to discuss Institutional Cooperation with Srikrishnan Institute of Ophthalmology.

It was a highly productive five weeks. Our appreciation and gratitude go to all of the volunteers and organizers for making it possible for him to reach so many, resulting in heightened interest in our mission and significant commitment for support.

After Summer, Sarada Vidyalayam reopened in June as a high school and admitted 128 students in grades 1 to 8. The high school construction is almost completed. Plans to start the Vocational School in 2008 are underway; we are gathering resources for construction as well as for operating.

Srikiran Institute of Ophthalmology with its four Vision Centres continues to provide quality eye care. In 2007 so far, 106 pediatric and 106 adult screening camps were conducted, 9,209 cataract and 699 other surgeries were performed; 11,313 out-patients were treated.
